#### Hurricane Ian (Category 4)- September 28, 2022

- -Effects felt across the State of Florida
- -16 in of rain, 8-10 ft peak storm surge
- -Widespread damage to infrastructure, homes, and local economy
- -County faced immediate challenges in emergency response
- Flash flooding in Orange County, damage to roadways and rescue operations necessary





### Impacts to Orange County

- -Housing
  - Reported damage to 10,591 housing units (FEMA/NFIP claims)
- -Infrastructure
  - Majority of improvements related to stormwater, drainage, capacity improvements to existing facilities
- -Economic Revitalization
  - SBA's business loan information reported 1,031 business applications issued as a result of Hurricane Ian
- Estimated over \$300 million in damages







HUD awarded Orange County total of \$219,712,000 -\$191,054,000 in CDBG-DR grant funds **CDBG-DR Allocations for 2022** for unmet needs State of Florida \$728,499,200 -\$28,658,000 awarded for mitigation **Orange County \$219,712,000** (15% of unmet needs) \$1,107,811,000 Lee County Sarasota County \$201,535,000 HUD funds are typically allocated to \$328,910,000 Volusia the state of Florida, but Orange County \$2,586,537,200 Total received direct funding -Designated as a Most Impacted and Distressed (MID) area

-One of four (4) counties most impacted by Hurricane Ian

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CDBG-DR is a flexible set of funds to carry out a wide range of activities related to:

- **–**Disaster relief
- -Long-term recovery
- -Restoration of infrastructure and housing
- -Economic revitalization
- -Mitigation of risk





### Major goals of CDBG-DR

- -Address unmet needs relating to
  - Housing (e.g., repairs to single-family and multifamily units, replacement, new construction)
  - Infrastructure (e.g., water, sewer, drainage)
  - Public Services (e.g., job training, mental health counseling)
  - Economic Revitalization (e.g., small business loans)
- -Improve mitigation and resiliency
- -Ensure funding and programs prioritize underserved and vulnerable populations
- Project activities must be tied to Hurricane lan




# Funding guidelines

- -At least 70% of the funds must be spent on activities benefitting Low-Moderate Income (LMI) individuals or areas
  - LMI Areas census tracts with greater than 50% of households designated as LMI (80% of Area Median Income (AMI))
  - \$70,200 for household of 4
- -At least 15% of funds must be spent for mitigation activities that increase resilience to disasters and reduce long-term risk

- -Develop Action Plan
  - Unmet Needs Analysis
  - Citizen Input and Engagement
  - Proposed Uses of Funds
- -Public access via website
- **Develop Implementation Plan** 
  - Administrative Requirements
  - Procurement and Contracting
  - Financial Management
  - Reporting

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# Action Plan Development

### Key Components

- -Unmet Needs and Mitigation Assessment
  - Data gathering
  - State of housing/disaster impact
- -Citizen Input and Engagement
  - Key component of the plan to address unmet needs
  - Determining most appropriate activities to fund
- Proposed use of funds based on the unmet/mitigation needs and citizen input



## HUD requires data on unmet needs for:

- -Housing
- -Infrastructure and Public Facilities
- -Businesses
- Data Sources
  - -Federal: FEMA/SBA/U.S. Census Bureau
  - -Local: County Departments/Jurisdictions/Public Housing Authorities
  - -Community Partners: Advocacy Groups / Continuum of Care / Providers of Homeless Services
  - -Affected County Residents

# Focus groups with community partners/organizations

- **-Top comments received:** 
  - Affordable Housing and Housing Rehabilitation and Repair
  - Hurricane Preparedness and Resiliency and Mental Health Services
- Survey made available to public via website
  - -Active from September 25 through Nov 10, 2023
  - -Available in English, Spanish and Creole

13 community meetings held September-November 2023

-At least 2 meetings held in each Commission District

-223 resident attendees









# Citizen Input and Engagement

# Main issues identified by residents

- Continuous flooding, drainage issues
- Need for mitigation: preservation of wetlands, upgrades to stormwater management systems, power lines underground, etc.
- Debris removal/trash pickup/tree trimming
- Pre-disaster prep (disaster planning, food distribution) and post-disaster response
- Need for housing rehab/special needs housing
- Rising homeowner insurance costs

- Mobile home issues/repair needs/etc.
- Need for additional emergency shelters (including pet-friendly), cooling stations
- Public service needs (health, mental health, job training and placement)
- Spending priorities: Housing (homeowner rehab and some new construction), Infrastructure (drainage/utilities & water/wastewater facilities), Public Services

# **Citizen Input and Engagement**

Online survey responses regarding impacts of Hurricane Ian:


- -36.48% of respondents reported property damage
- -6.42% of respondents had to move because of damage to their property
- -5.53% of respondents reported their residences are still unsafe
- -54% of respondents reported ongoing flooding and street drainage concerns in their neighborhoods during normal rain events

# **Citizen Input and Engagement**

# Survey responses regarding spending priorities of CDBG-DR funds:

#### -31% Infrastructure Projects

- Roads, bridges, water and sewer projects
- -23% Mitigation
  - Help reduce future impacts
- -13% Housing
  - Rehab and new construction
- -13% Public Services
  - Counseling, education, employment services

# Housing Activities

-Activities that lead to restoring and improving the housing stock conditions

- Rehabilitation and reconstruction of single-family owned housing
- Rehabilitation of rental housing owned by private and nonprofit housing organizations
- New construction
- Broadband infrastructure for any reconstruction or new construction of a building with more than four rental units

#### -Program Allocation: \$108,746,160 (49.5%)



### Infrastructure and Public Facilities

- -Activities that rebuild, replace, or strengthen impacted assets that provide or support services to the general public, such as:
  - Roadways
  - Storm water and sewer infrastructure
  - Water resource projects
  - Shelters (Homeless, Emergency, etc.)

-Program Allocation: \$59,322,240 (27%)



# Mitigation

- Activities that increase disaster resilience for future disasters and to reduce or eliminate long-term risk of loss of life, injury, damage to and loss of property
- -Must be part of rebuilding efforts through CDBG-DR eligible activities
  - Enhance and increase resiliency to homes (e.g., new roofs, hurricane straps, drainage)
  - Increase infrastructure capacity (e.g. increase stormwater capacity in flood-prone areas)
  - Strengthen public facilities (e.g. increase capacity and resilience of storm shelters)
- -Program Allocation: \$28,658,000 (13%)



### Economic Revitalization

- Orange County has implemented initiatives to assist businesses with economic recovery
  - CARES Funding- 8,000 small businesses received a total of \$80 million in grants utilizing CARES funding
  - \$31.3 million in business assistance through American Rescue Plan
    - Orange County established the Small Business BOOST program
  - Orange County established Business Assistance for Neighborhood Corridors (BANC) program



### Public Services

- -Activities that support housing and economic revitalization
  - Housing counseling
  - Job training and workforce development
  - Services that promote financial literacy and self-sufficiency
  - Mental health counseling

-Program Allocation: \$7,000,000 (3.2%)



# Administration

 Activities necessary to ensure proper grant management, implementation and compliance requirements of CDBG-DR for a minimum of six years

-Program Allocation: \$10,985,600 (5%)

### Planning and Studies

-Costs to conduct mitigation and resiliency studies to address future hazards and storms

-Program Allocation: \$5,000,000 (2.3%)



#### Programs and Project Selection

- -Housing rehabilitation program administered through Orange County with support from key vendors
- Applicants will apply directly through our CDBG-DR website when program opens
- -Countywide Request for Proposals (RFP) to identify eligible projects for rental rehabilitation and new affordable housing
- Infrastructure, public facilities- RFP from cities to identify eligible projects
- Public service activities will be implemented by non-profits selected through competitive processes



# Compliance and Monitoring

HUD Requirements for preventing fraud, waste, and abuse

- -Procedures to detect and prevent fraud, waste, and abuse of funds
- -Maintain a fraud hotline
- -HUD Inspector General monitors CDBG-DR grants and conducts audits
- HUD Requirements to prevent duplication of benefits
  - Assess and document previous benefits awarded (e.g., FEMA claims) prior to services
  - -Ensure CDBG-DR funding is funding of last resort



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# Next Steps & Action Items

- December 13, 2023 Community Development Advisory Board
- January 9, 2024 BCC Public Hearing on CDBG-DR Action Plan
- January 11, 2024 Public comment period closes for Draft Action Plan
- January 18, 2024 Deadline to submit CDBG-DR Action and Implementation Plans to HUD for review
- 2024 Expand operations (staff capacity and consulting services)
- 2024-2030 Orange County will have 6 years from the Funding Agreement execution date to spend the funds
