

Prepare Your Yard Now for Hurricane Season!



Don't wait until a storm is on the radar to clean up your yard. As a storm approaches, yard waste collection could be temporarily suspended. After a storm, there may be collection delays throughout the impacted area.





How much can I put out each week?

1 cubic yard

Each household can set out up to **3 cubic yards** of yard waste per week—that's about the size of **3 stoves**.



...limbs and palm fronds?

Cut them to **3 feet or less** and **bundle** with string or twine. Each bundle must weigh **less than 60 pounds**.

What should I do with tree stumps?...

...leaves and grass clippings?



Put them in **your own personal cans or bags**. Keep each can and bag **under 60 pounds** when full.

Cut stumps into pieces

no longer than 3 feet,

and make sure each piece

Be sure to set items out correctly. **DO NOT** place yard waste in county roll carts. Visit ocfl.net/YardWaste for complete collection guidelines.



After enjoying your Fourth of July fireworks, remember to handle and dispose of them safely. Soak cooled fireworks in water, bag up, and toss in the garbage cart. Improper disposal can damage the cart and waste collection equipment, harm the neighborhood, and injure workers. Fireworks are NOT recyclable, so keep them out of the recycling cart. Every item we throw away is a reminder that our planet's resources are limited. Small, mindful actions can collectively make a big difference. Let's embrace the simple actions of **REDUCE**, **REUSE**, and **RECYCLE**, and take meaningful steps toward creating a cleaner, healthier environment for future generations to enjoy.

REDUCE what you consume. Cutting down on excess helps conserve precious resources.

REUSE whenever you can. Find a creative way to repurpose items, whether it's a glass jar, a tote bag, or clothes. See the options below for places to donate your items.

RECYCLE RIGHT Give materials a new beginning rather than

an end in a landfill. **Think 5** and only put these empty and dry items in the blue lid recycling cart:
